



"Open House"

I have only purchased a couple of houses in my lifetime and have only had to sell one (and that was trying enough). Those of you who were around when I came to serve here in Laurens might remember that it took me about 3 ½ years to sell my house in Abbeville. I can't tell you how many times we had to "show" our house in hopes that we could secure a buyer and move this way. "Showing" a house doesn't in itself sound that taxing, except when you add a working couple, three kids, and a dog. Like most of you (I'd guess), keeping a house in "show" condition in real life can be a daunting challenge. You see, there is the thing called "life" that tends to put a kink in keeping a house ready to show at a moment's notice.

People would parade through our house looking at every detail and would make a determination as to why or how it didn't quite work for them. For those that really wanted to purchase the house, they seemed to have their own challenges in finalizing the purchase. Finally, God worked it out to connect someone who liked the house and had the money to make it happen. That was a good day for our entire family. Anyway, I am so glad that we got through that process and were able to get moved to Laurens County. I don't plan to go anywhere anytime soon (read never). Hopefully, my days of staging for an open house are over.

As I was thinking about all of this, I started thinking about how houses have some similarities to our lives. You see, it is human nature to want for others to see us at our best "show" condition. The problem is that we know our own hearts, along with our weaknesses and our tendency toward sin. Like the old hymn says, "Prone to wander Lord, I feel it, prone to leave the one I love." As a result, what can happen is that in our desire to be seen all cleaned up and looking good, we can begin to lean toward fakeness. Much like the children's toys that we masterfully stuffed in the closet obstructed from view during some of our house "showings," our cluttered lives can become nothing more than a carefully orchestrated facade. Many of us have disappointments, heart-ache, failures, and more that we too often want to pretend are not a part of life's situation. We hope that others will not see through it all and see the real us. We may think that if people really knew what we were struggling with, that they may choose not befriend us. Since those fears are often warranted, it oftentimes seems easier to cover up rather than risk transparency. However, the truth is that we all broken people, scarred by our own sin and the sinful world we live in.

Here is the wonderful truth about the gospel of Jesus Christ. We don't have to pretend that we are not broken ourselves, but we can choose to acknowledge it, repent of it, trust Jesus with it and allow Him to make a mosaic from our broken pieces. That is amazing grace! It always amazes me the way that messed up and broken people were drawn to Jesus, all while the religious elites (Pharisees) were repulsed by "those people." It's not that Jesus overlooked people's brokenness and sin, but that He came to heal and forgive it. Too often, I fear we as church folks resemble those religious elites more than we do our Savior. The sooner we become more grateful about what Christ has done and is doing in us than we are about what people think of us, the sooner we will begin to have a gospel impact in our County and world. So, let's choose to have an "open house" of our lives gratefully displaying what Christ has done by His grace, while proclaiming the amazing truth that He can do it for the other broken, sinful people as well!

All this "open house" talk makes me begin thinking about that the renovation at our Disciple's trail property (the main building and shelter) is nearing completion. You will be amazed at how it looks, if you hadn't been down to the property for some years. So, in order to facilitate the folks from our churches having an opportunity to see the property, we plan to have an "open house" (of sorts) by having our Associational annual meeting at the Disciple's Trail Retreat Center this year. The date for our meeting will be October 22nd at 6:45 pm (note the date change as it had been previously set for the week earlier). This will be an opportunity to not only come and gather for our annual meeting, but also to celebrate where we've come with OUR property and hear from the ad hoc committee about where we plan to go. We have some spit shining to do before then, but Lord willing it will be ready to "show" when we gather together on October 22nd. Reiny


